River Towns Mark 75th **Anniversary of '37Flood**

On January 26, 1937, the Ohio River reached it's highest level ever at Cincinnati — nearly 80 feet. Photos from the archives of the Delhi Historical Society show some of the devastation in our area. At right is River Road at Darby Lane (the house is still standing today.) Below is a photo of Delhi Avenue in Sedamsville. Some of our older members recall boards or ladders connecting second floors

between houses as a means of getting to homes where they could get to dry land.


Historical Society Wins Best Costume
