Food & Drink in a Cincinnati German Regiment



Hardtack and Lager Beer: Food & Drink in a Cincinnati German Regiment.

Presented by Andrew Houghtaling - Director of the Ninth Ohio: A Living History. Drinking beer and eating sauerkraut – Myth or reality? Goetta in the field? Join us as we explore the cultural identity of this storied German regiment - "die Neuner," through the food and drink they wrote home about.

Organized in Cincinnati under Col. Robert M. McCook, the members of the regiment were pri-

marily of German descent. The 9th was mustered into three months service April 22nd, 1861 and reorganized into three years service May 28 1861. The Regiment returned to Camp Dennison and was mustered out, June 7, 1864.

Cincinnati is Full of Firsts

Our January 10 program was cancelled, so now we bring back author Rick Pender to discuss his



book *Oldest Cincinnati*. As one of the original settlements in the Northwest Territory, Cincinnati is full of firsts and oldests. Hear stories of a ferry that enabled early settlers to cross the river at Augusta, Kentucky, in 1798; it's still

in business today. An inn providing shelter for early stagecoach travelers opened in 1803 in Lebanon, Ohio, and continues welcoming guests to this day.

The Beauty and Power of Rain



The expression "April showers brings May flowers" can be traced back to England from the 1500s poet Thomas Tusser. Back then, he wrote "Sweet April showers do spring May Flowers." In extension, meaning a period of discomfort or hardship can provide the basis for a period of happiness and joy.

I'm one of those odd duck—get it, ducks—who actually enjoys walking in the rain - not a monsoon mind you - but a good, lightening free rain is a wonderful time to take a walk. I always think of the rain as cleansing the earth, feeding our flora and fauna and filling our rivers and streams which in turn gives us life. For without the rain, life as we know it would cease to exist. This past April has blessed us with many rain showers...some might say a few too many! However, my lawn and the park where I walk have never looked better. This spring Mother Nature has once again risen to the occasion and the flowers are once again in bloom. And of course I would be remiss if I didn't mention our upcoming flower sale which is our

biggest fund raiser of the year! We'll have plenty of wondrous well fed flowers available for you to enjoy courtesy of our benefactor, Bob Maddux.

As much as I love a good rain and even thunderstorm, I am not immune to the powerful effects of water. In researching my own family tree I learned my greatgreat grandfather, Franciscus Kuper, drowned while taking a bath in the Muddy Creek in July 1865. I was stunned to learn of this and even contacted longtime weatherman Steve Hortstmeyer who was able to confirm that heavy rains did indeed fall in Delhi in the days leading up to Franciscus' drowning which caused flash flooding. He was just thirty years old, leaving behind his wife and infant daughter, Maria Catherine who went by "Kate"; she would one day marry my great grandfather, Eduard Klawitter and purchase a saloon on Neeb Road. After Eduard died in 1910, great grandma Kate ran Klawitter's and also purchased adjacent property in the area...what is now Faysel Drive.

In an eerie coincidence, my Godmother Kathy Hahn, who was also my first cousin - would drown in

the creek at Wulff Run in Delhi almost 100 years after our great-great grandfather's own drowning death. Some of you reading this may recall her untimely passing on April 3, 1964; Kathy was just eighteen years old and on her way to Seton High School when the tragedy occurred. Kathy sometimes worked at Klawitter's which from 1895 – 1971 was located just across the street from Our Lady of Victory Church. Kathy would either be working or just hanging out with the rest of her cousins up at Klawitter's which by 1964 expanded into a grocery, furniture and toy store, bar, restaurant and picnic grove.

I have learned much about Kathy over the years

from my immediate and extended family. I'm told she was quite the pistol with a great sense of humor, wit, and "orneriness" about her. It seems Kathy would have done a lot more than walk in the rain. All the tales I've heard of my Godmother lead me to believe that for Kathy - life wasn't about waiting for the storm to pass...it was about dancing in the rain. And I'd like to think both Franciscus and Kathy, who both perished due to rain, so young and so many years ago, are thrilled to be thought of today. There is a quote by Vladamir Nabokov, "I cannot be angry with the rain; it simply does not know how to fall upwards." So I'll continue my walks in the rain and ponder both its power and the beauty it brings.
